Poison Sumac Rash Management Plan

Step-by-Step Guide for Identification, Treatment, and Prevention

Overview

This plan helps identify, treat, and prevent poison sumac rashes from urushiol exposure. Use the checklists for quick action and tracking.

1 Plant Identification and Prevention

- **Key Features**: 7-13 leaflets per leaf, smooth edges, reddish stems, white berries. Grows in wetlands.
- **Protective Measures**: Wear long clothing, boots, and gloves in risky areas. Apply barrier creams.
- Avoidance Tips: Use plant ID apps; stay on trails; wash pets after outings.

2 Immediate and Daily Treatment

- First Response: Wash with soap and cool water within 30 minutes. Launder clothes hot.
- **Symptom Relief**: Apply calamine or hydrocortisone twice daily. Use oatmeal baths for 20 minutes.
- Monitoring: Watch for swelling or infection; avoid scratching.

3 When to Seek Help

See a doctor if:

- Rash spreads widely or affects eyes/mouth.
- Fever, pus, or severe pain occurs.
- Symptoms last over 3 weeks.
